

Minutes of Committee Meeting held at the Goblin Hat House on Wednesday 3 February 1988

The President, Sandy Baggan in the chair.

Apologies were received from Mrs Darby, Mrs Hamilton, Mrs Kerr & Mrs Wilson.

Minutes of the meeting held on 25 November 1987, were approved & signed by the President.

Matters arising.

1) Winter meetings:

- a) Sweet Peas. - a talk by Mrs Andrew Heatley was very well received by an appreciative audience.
- b) Presentation of exhibits - short talks were given by Mr Kirkness on vegetables & Mr T Hardwick on flowers. As Mrs Yvonne Henderson has a previous engagement, the Secretary was instructed to write to her for a list of the points she would look for in judging.
- c) Shrubs. - Mr Willie Duncan to be invited to talk on this subject on 23 March.

2. Bulk Buying Scheme. Mr Baggan had obtained prices for peat, compost, growbags & Growmore. It was decided to order the compost only from Lalestonian Peat Co. (being cheaper) & the rest from Lawsons. Lawsons' prices include delivery to Gifford. Transport would be required for the compost as Lalestonian do not deliver - if not available revert to Lawsons. It was also decided to buy slug pellets.

Deposit Account Balance being £1460. Cash flow position is good with the current account modestly in the black. The Treasurer was thanked for his meticulous work.

Points arising from Flower Show.

It was suggested there should be 3 judges for the Industrial Section allocated as follows.

1. Wines and Preserves.
2. Baking.
3. Handicrafts.

The public liability insurance this year was £75. It was therefore agreed the Secretary would contact the Royal Horticultural Society with a view to becoming affiliated so that we could benefit from their very reasonable insurance scheme.

It was suggested that the price of schedule adverts should be increased next year and possibly the schedule. The question of whether the auction should be held

inside the marquee or outside was discussed. On balance, it was agreed it would be better to keep it inside the marquee.

The raffle should continue to be held at 4pm on the Sunday but immediately the draw is completed, exhibitors should be allowed to uplift their produce. They should be allowed adequate time for this purpose (say about 30 minutes) before the Auction takes place.

Prizemoney should be handed out between 2-3pm. on the Sunday as well as the present 4-5pm on the Saturday. The schedule and the notice will require amendment.

The question of providing extra staging for pot plants should be explored including an indication of the cost.

The provision of a floral arrangement on top of the extra staging was a possibility even if this meant purchasing flowers.

Additional black plastic will have to be purchased for next year.

The President asked the Committee to note any additional suggestions for next year's Flower Show as they came to mind with a view to raising them at a future meeting.

Treasurer's Report.

The Treasurer wished to record his sincere thanks to the previous Treasurer, Peter Skea, for his assistance and valuable guidance.

David Hill then went over the details of the Show income and expenditure as noted overleaf, drawing attention to the income from the raffle, over double from the auction and commendable returns from the competition and the teas. He regarded the latter as a welcome service for those attending the Show. On the expenditure side, the Treasurer drew attention to the much reduced cost of printing the Schedules and the fact that Mr. Burgess

did not charge for the electricity. The Treasurer has written to and thanked all those who had made donations.

If the donations to the Prize Fund (£75 excluding £20 from Leics of Norwich which is included above) are added to the income, this reduces the deficit on the Show to £368.04.

The President thanked David Hill for his clear presentation of the Show accounts.

It was suggested that it may be worthwhile restarting a list of donating Patrons.

The Treasurer concluded his report by indicating that the Deposit Account amounted to £1917 and the Current Account to £195, a total of £2112 from which £850 still had to be paid for the hire of the marquee and tables. Memberships was now 208, the highest ever.

Annual General Meeting.

All the office bearers and committee members present indicated their willingness to continue in office. The AGM will be held either on 16, 23 or 24 November depending on the availability of the Hall. The Treasurer will make the necessary enquiries. A short committee meeting will be held at 7pm. to finalise arrangements, all the AGM will commence at 7.30 pm. H.M. Quyn had agreed to Audit the accounts.

Other Business.

The President mentioned that the Inter-Society Competition this year will be at the Dalkeith Show on 17 & 18 September. David Grundray will provide the vegetables and possibly one of the vases of flowers from chrysanthemums or dahlias, the other being gladioli from Norman Craig. Peter Shea may be able to provide a pot plant. Anne Jeffray will be approached to provide the flower arrangement in a tea cup and Mrs. C. Bathgate the shortbread. Margaret Kerr will be responsible for the presentation.

Winter meetings: The President is to approach Sidney Clark to see if he will provide a slide show at the AGM. Other speakers suggested for the meetings in 1989 were Dr. Stuart, Jim Jeamine, the Regius Keeper of the RBG as one of his staff, Tom Shearer and a speaker on Organic Gardening. Other speakers who came to mind should be intimated to the President.

Summer Competition: Peter Shea announced that 17 youngsters had taken part. The winner was Andrew Douglas with a 9 ft. plant! Emma Douglas

was second and Pamela Dickson was third.
 Peter Shea was thanked for all the work he had
 put into organising this competition.

£1,200 worth of peat, compost etc was sold at reduced prices. Members can also purchase garden requirements at wholesale prices at Lawson Donaldson by quoting the Society's number (1476). Clifford won the Ladies Society competition this year at Dulkeith Show for the third time.

The President thanked Mrs Peter Shea for organising the sponsored Sunflower competition among the youngsters which raised the remarkable sum of £144.00. The competition was won by A. Douglas and Emma Douglas & 3rd Pamela Dickson.

The President thanked the Office Bearers & Committee members for their assistance & support over the last year.
