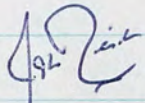

A good attendance of members. Sir Peter Reid in the Chair.

and had always taken a great interest in the Society, and
Miss Weddell had been the longest serving member of the
Committee when she resigned a year ago.

QUALITY NOT QUANTITY AT GIFFORD FLOWER SHOW

Quality not quantity was the theme at Gifford Flower Show held in the village on Saturday afternoon. Hundreds of visitors were impressed with the extremely high standard of exhibits - but many sections were conspicuous only by their absence.

Entries in every section were down compared with last year but there was consolation for the organisers in the fact that poor weather previous to the show was the main reason for the disappointing response.

Only the vegetables escaped serious damage from the torrential rain early last week.

The judges were extremely impressed, however, and all said that the standard had seldom been higher.

The secretary, Mrs M. Murray, said the worst hit section had been the cottagers. It was a wonderful tribute to their enterprise and hard work that they had, between them, put on a creditable display. "It was a feature of the show that the judges had great difficulty in awarding the prizes. They said the standard was quite remarkable," she said.

The President, Admiral Sir Peter Reid, referring to the poor response, said that the organisation had good reason for dismay. He pleaded to local gardeners to step forward next year "and make a real go of it."

The show was a real triumph for local butcher, Mr David Grindlay. As in past years, he excelled himself winning two cups - the Cottager and Amateur Trophies. Mr Grindlay took up competitive gardening only a few years ago, but has proved to have 'green fingers'. It was the third time that he had scored a double at the show.

For most of the afternoon the marquee was packed, not only with local people but with many visitors, who were impressed by the organisation and standard of the show.

The opening ceremony was performed by Mrs R. S. Salvesen, Eaglescarnie, who said that she was overwhelmed by the standard of the exhibits of local men and women. Mrs Salvesen had always been an admirer of anyone who could produce beautiful flowers or wonderful vegetables and added that it said a great deal for the community spirit of the village that the standard was so high.
